## Undergraduate Research

Unique experiences previously reserved for university students now available at Anoka-Ramsey

A noka-Ramsey offers a wide variety of Undergraduate Research opportunities in biology, chemistry, geography, communication studies, philosophy, political science and sociology.

For example, through the Community College Undergraduate Research Initiative supported by the National Science Foundation, Anoka-Ramsey students conduct leading-edge scientific research in chemisty and computer science.

Chemistry instructor Christopher Lutz oversees research using a Matrix Assisted Laser Desorption/Ionization (MALDI) mass spectrometer. This experience is valuable for students like David Schiller and Benjamin Burdorf. "Getting hands-on experience with the MALDI technique will really help me analyze things later on," Schiller says. Burdorf also enjoyed MALDI research. "It broadened my education experience."

In January 2016, Biology instructor Melanie Waite-Altringer with three of her undergraduate research students, Cassandra Bauer, Cassie Keocher and Maxwell Waite, presented their research work titled "Beneficial Pollinating Insect Study on Various Flowering Fields: Wildflowers, Restored Prairie, and an Energy Crop of Canola," to Bayer CropScience at their headquarters in Durham, N.C.

# MANE Nursing Education at Anoka-Ramsey Provides Access to Baccalaureate Education

In 2014, the Anoka-Ramsey Nursing program joined the Minnesota Alliance for Nursing Education (MANE) consortium, allowing students to earn a baccalaureate nursing education in conjunction with Metropolitan State University. Students complete all coursework at Anoka-Ramsey, moving smoothly from the two-year program to a four-year program. The Anoka-Ramsey Nursing program at Coon Rapids and Cambridge is the largest among Minnesota community colleges. The college has offered the program for nearly 50 years, beginning shortly after the school was founded. The Cambridge Campus Nursing program opened in 2003 to reach more students in greater Minnesota. Today there are 3,000+ Nursing alumni from Anoka-Ramsey.

The Nursing program admits 112 students every semester, with a graduation rate of 85 percent or higher. The program educates nurses of all ages, from 17-yearold high school students through the Post-Secondary Enrollment Option (PSEO) to students in their mid-sixties.

Since implementing the MANE curriculum, the program has seen even higher graduation and completion rates, including successful board certifications for students. "We want to be sure that students get the support they need to follow through and complete the program," says Dean of Nursing Sandra Kohler.

### MANE curriculum attracted Alumna Christine Andres to Join Faculty

When Christine Andres was working toward her Associate of Science in nursing at the

Cambridge Campus in 2005, "Marees she thought she might return later to teach. "I love the health care field," says Andres. She earned a Bachelor of Science in Biology from the University of Wisconsin–Oshkosh, then worked in marketing and sales—but always had a desire to pursue a career in health care. She felt that nursing was a perfect fit for her.

After moving to Minnesota, Andres earned her Associate of Science in nursing at Anoka-Ramsey, followed by a Bachelor of Science in Nursing from Metropolitan State University. She then worked at Kanabec County Public Health as a Family Health Supervisor for 10 years.

Andres stayed in touch with Anoka-Ramsey faculty and classmates and attended fundraising events. She revisited the idea of teaching. Finally, after completing her doctorate in Nursing Practice at the University of Minnesota in 2014, she began as a part-time instructor at the Cambridge Campus in 2014, becoming a full-time faculty member in 2015.

Andres was especially attracted by the MANE curriculum. "That was something I was extremely passionate about, and I wanted to be here to teach that curriculum," Andres says. "The program is designed to create critical thinking in nurses, to help them handle complex health care needs and the changes that are happening in the system."

The first course in the MANE curriculum is based on wellness, health promotion and preventive health care, "which is different than what had been presented historically," Andres says. "It is a way of

> educating nurses, enhancing nurses to be more effective and have an impact in the workforce."

# Art Department Highlights Alumni Work

Art Department Alumni Exhibition showcased 36 alumni spanning 30 years. Works included drawing, painting, sculpture, photography, printmaking, fabric, ceramics, glass blowing and mixed media.



he Art Department has grown tremendously," says instructor Laura Migliorino, reviewing her years teaching at Anoka-Ramsey. She brought traditional black-and-white photography, silver and digital imaging, medium and large format, and even pinhole photography, to the department. "Part of what has made the program stand out is the breadth of media represented," Migliorino explains. The department allows students to pursue media such as bronze casting, printmaking and glass blowing in the Visual Art Center facility that was built in 2010.

Migliorino noted that many students remain connected to the college. Students have gone on to earn bachelor's or master's degrees at The School of the Art Institute of Chicago, the University of Minnesota, Minneapolis College of Art and Design, and the University of Wisconsin-River Falls—one of only a few regional schools to offer classes in glass blowing.

"Higher education research tells us that when students make a personal connection on campus, make good friends, it adds to that positive feeling," says Migliorino. "In art, the interactions with faculty are much more personal. You're not in a large lecture, you're always working one-on-one." Students develop strong relationships with peers as well, maintaining them in part thanks to the official alumni chapter of the Art Department.

Migliorino, whose work is in the permanent collections of the Walker Art Center and the Weisman Art Museum, describes her experience at Anoka-Ramsey: "It's a strong faculty in terms of working artists; you're going to be working with people who are doing it. I love what I do. The great thing about Anoka-Ramsey students is that they come in eager to learn."

# Celebrating 50 Years of Athletic Excellence at Anoka-Ramsey

The Athletics Department celebrated its inaugural Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony in February. The event focused on athletes, teams, coaches, and others who have made exceptional contributions to Anoka-Ramsey Athletics.



### Hall of Fame Inductees

Marjorie Rosendahl, a former physical education/adapted physical education teacher in the Fridley and Anoka-Hennepin school districts, has supported the Anoka-Ramsey athletic community for more than 20 years, serving as scorekeeper for men's and women's basketball and volleyball.

**Bob Barnette,** a former high school basketball champion and retired counselor

from Fridley High School, where he served as an assistant football and basketball coach. He has been a basketball timer for Fridley High School and Anoka-Ramsey since 1973.

**Bonnie Johnson,** a former member of the Anoka-Ramsey Women's Basketball team in 2004, named MVP after her team won the 2005 National Championship. During two years at Anoka-Ramsey, she scored more than 1,000 points and was named All-American, going on to play at Missouri Valley College (MVC). In her final year at MVC, she scored 1,015 points and earned another First Team All-HAAC All-American honor.

**Kenneth Mauer**, a former football, basketball, and baseball player for the Golden Rams, was named All-American in baseball at Anoka-Ramsey in 1974. He continued playing baseball at the University of Minnesota, named All-Big Ten in 1977. Over the past 30 years, Ken has become a highly-respected basketball official in the National Basketball Association (NBA).

Jeff Peland, who was named first team All-American for the 1993–94 season, earned All-Division Honors in basketball at Anoka-Ramsey. He then attended the University of Minnesota at Morris and joined the Cougars' National Tournament Team in 1994 to 95. In his senior year at Southwest Minnesota State, he earned first team All-Conference for the Mustangs. Jeff returned to Anoka-Ramsey to serve as assistant basketball coach from 1997 to 2004.

The ceremony also honored the **1993–94 Anoka-Ramsey Women's Basketball Team**. Head Coach **Dan Meilke** was selected regional and national Coach of the Year; he led the team to an overall record of 30–1. Team members **DeDe Nelson**, **Lisa Lashinski**, Joleen Mattilla, **Linda Lashinski**, Linda Klug, Tana Wurm, Mary Schueller, Sarah Cecka, Carolyn Perman, Colleen McGuire, Jennifer Mueller, Cari Hartwig and Jenny Fernholz won the National Junior College Division III National Championship.

# Excellence in Women's Basketball

College Athletic Coordinator Dave Alto would not single out one athletic program (Men's Baseball, Women's Softball, Men's and Women's Basketball, Men's and Women's Soccer and Women's Volleyball) as the strongest—but the Women's Basketball team certainly has an outstanding record, including the 1993–94 team, and the team that won the National Championship in 2005 that included Anoka-Ramsey Hall of Famer and MVP Bonnie Johnson. The Golden Rams Women's Basketball team has won the NJCAA Division III Women's Basketball national championship seven times.

The team won the Region XIIIA Championship this past year, beating Minnesota West Community and Technical College 78–68. They advanced to the national tournament in New Jersey in March, where they finished sixth.
