n the last newsletter, I spoke about several innovative and education-enhancing initiatives happening at Anoka-Ramsey Community College, and how we want to shout these accomplishments to the world.

Those initiatives, among many others, played a significant part in a recent honor afforded to only a handful of community colleges in the entire nation. It was announced recently that Anoka-Ramsey Community College was named one of the top 10 community colleges in the nation by the prestigious Aspen Institute, an international education nonprofit.

Two-year institutions, including Anoka-Ramsey, on the shortlist for the 2017 Aspen Prize for Community College Excellence, demonstrated strong outcomes in three areas of student learning:

- Student success in persistence, completion and transfer
- Consistent improvement in student outcomes over time
- Equity in outcomes for students of all ethnic and socioeconomic backgrounds

Aspen officials were on campus in October to validate the data, meet our fantastic faculty and staff, and learn more about us. The winners of the Aspen Prize will be announced during a large celebratory event in Washington D.C. in March.

Whether or not Anoka-Ramsey takes home the number one prize, we could not be more proud to be recognized for the hard work and dedication to student success that happens at our campuses every day. I am personally honored to be a part of such an amazing college.

Aspen Prize Finalist

Anoka-Ramsey named Top 10 Community College in the U.S.

The Aspen Institute is an educational and policy studies organization based in Washington, D.C. Every two years since 2011, the institute awards a \$1 million prize to community colleges for excellence in four areas: student learning; certificate and degree completion; employment and earnings for graduates; and access and success for minority and low-income students.

To measure these criteria, the institute looks at student success in more than 1,000 public community colleges nationwide. In September, the field was narrowed to 10 finalists—including Anoka-Ramsey Community College. The prize will be awarded in March 2017 in Washington, D.C. to the winner and up to four finalists with distinction.

Aspen Institute reviewers gave Anoka-Ramsey Community College high marks for several reasons, including:

- Excellent three-year graduation/transfer rate of 56 percent
- Opportunities for students who are first in their families to attend college
- Programs for students still in high school, both high achievers and those in the middle
- The lowest-cost tuition and fees of any higher education institution in Minnesota
- High success rates for both white populations and students of color

Joshua Wyner, Executive Director, Aspen Institute's College Excellence Program, says "We were incredibly impressed by the efforts of Anoka-Ramsey Community College faculty and staff to nourish a deep culture of support for students. That, paired with an unusually strong undergraduate research program and a clear focus on teaching and learning, makes Anoka-Ramsey Community College a uniquely supportive educational environment for Minnesota students."

As a finalist, Anoka-Ramsey is now subject to an extensive auditing process. The Aspen Institute representatives are reviewing data to assess improvements in learning, graduation, workforce and equitable outcomes for all students.

A Conversation with John Guenther and Tim Heil

It all started in 1971 at Anoka-Ramsey Community College with a course titled "Man and the Environment". The course was taught collaboratively by six faculty members and attended by about 18 students. One of the instructors was John Guenther. One of the students was Tim Heil.

hey didn't know at the time they would become lifelong friends.

At first, with course readings such as "The Population Bomb" by Paul Ehrlich and "Silent Spring" by Rachel Carson, Guenther worried that students would feel pessimistic about the future. As Heil recalls, Guenther was right. "I remember," Heil says, "feeling extremely discouraged about energy consumption."

Guenther was new to community college life when the course was created. "I entered the system to take a job, and became such a fan after my experience—the faculty were so knowledgeable, sophisticated and open-minded. Probably stronger than anything else was the contact we had with students."


One of those students was Heil, who went on to attend Gustavus Adolphus College after leaving Anoka-Ramsey. He is now president of Heil Truck Brokerage, and still thinks of ideas and uses skills he learned in 1971.

Guenther moved from Anoka-Ramsey to the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources but kept his connection to the college in various ways, such as his friendship with Gene Merriam, who served on the Coon Rapids City Council and later in the Minnesota Legislature and strongly supports Anoka-Ramsey still today. Guenther also remains close to former Anoka-Ramsey Faculty member, Darby Nelson, who was the first ecologist Ph.D. in Minnesota, and of course with Heil.

Since the "Man and the Environment" course, Guenther and Heil have shared countless hours together, fishing, hunting and enjoying each other's conversation. In hindsight, Guenther says his past worries about teaching the course and making the students concerned about the future were mistaken. He pauses as he smiles at Heil and states, "We went beyond colleagues. We became friends. And here we are, 45 years later, doing fine."

Creative Writing Program Infused with Real Writers

Anoka-Ramsey is one of only three Minnesota colleges to provide an AFA in Creative Writing, along with an AA in Creative Writing. Courses transfer easily to four-year colleges, including articulation partners Metropolitan State University, Hamline University and Augsburg College.

or nearly 20 years, the **Two Rivers Reading Series** has introduced students to acclaimed writers. Guest authors have included Robert Bly, Louise Erdrich, Kao Kalia Yang, Alexs Pate and Wang Ping. "When you have the living, breathing author come to campus, that really brings the words to life," says Professor Chris McCarthy.

With abundant programming, guest authors, published professors and successful alumni, Anoka-Ramsey is a great place to begin a creative writing career. The following are a few examples of the creative writing connections offered to students.

- The Cambridge Campus offers the Minnesota
 Writers Series, a creative writing club, and a
 regular creative writing class. Instructor Bill Breen
 says, "Each semester, I'm amazed at the way my
 students combine creativity and critical thinking
 to investigate their lives. We have fun in the class
 but there's also serious self-discovery taking place."
- The course "A Writer's Life: Publishing, Proposals, and Grants" focuses on publishing, marketing, and public relations. The Associate in Fine Arts (AFA)

- capstone is a mentorship with a faculty member who writes in the student's chosen genre. The course culminates in a publishable manuscript that can be used as a writing sample for grant, work, or college applications.
- Poetry City, USA, is a year-long joint publishing project between the AFA creative writing programs at Anoka-Ramsey, Normandale and North Hennepin community colleges. Jasmin Ziegler, editorial professor for Poetry City, USA, also advises the Creative Writing Club that published "Rapids Review", the art and creative writing journal of the Coon Rapids Campus.
- The Careers in Writing speaker series introduces students to professional writers; guests have included Star Tribune music critic Jon Bream, senior books editor Laurie Hertzel, and senior travel editor Kerri Westenberg.
- Kathryn Kysar is the author of two books of poetry, "Pretend the World" and "Dark Lake", and editor of "Riding Shotgun: Women Write about Their Mothers".

January 2017 Creative Writing Faculty, Student, Alumni Briefs

- Professor Elizabeth Tannen was awarded a 2017 Minnesota State Arts Board (MSAB) grant in poetry for \$8,500. Tannen will work with a mentor to generate and revise two in-progress poem sequences and to compile her first full-length poetry manuscript.
- Creative writing alumnus Joshua Chase graduated in spring 2016 with a master's degree in Rhetoric and Writing from Saint Cloud State University, where he served as assistant director of the program's composition program. He entered a Ph.D. program in Rhetoric, Theory and Culture at Michigan Tech in fall 2016.
- Professor Paige Riehl is the poetry editor for the Midway Journal, an online literary magazine based in Saint Paul.
- Fall 2016 Creative Writing AFA graduate Taylor Houle published his creative nonfiction piece "Miracles" in the fall 2016 edition of "East Fork", an

- online literary magazine of work by two year students published by University of Cincinnati—Clermont College.
- Professor Scott Hall is the editor for the Minnesota English Journal, which publishes academic papers, teaching narratives, teaching materials and creative submissions.
- Creative writing alumnus Morgan Hughes graduated with an MFA in Creative Writing from Hamline University in May 2015 and recently published his creative non-fiction essay "God Hates Ventriloquists" in the online magazine "Fogged Clarity".
- Professor Kathryn Kysar will serve on a panel discussing "To Grade or Not to Grade: Assessment and Undergraduate Creative Writing" and reading her poetry at "Twenty Years of the Two Year College Caucus: A Celebration" at the Association of Writing Program's 50th Anniversary annual conference in Washington, D.C.

College Art Department builds wood fire kiln to enrich student experience



noka-Ramsey Community
College built a wood fire kiln
to provide students with the
opportunity to investigate ceramic
surfaces produced only through wood
firing. The kiln was completed in
September and loaded for the first time in
mid-October.

Art Faculty member, Mark Lambert was a driving force behind the project. This is an interview conducted with Lambert about the kiln.

Why did you want to build the kiln?

"Anoka-Ramsey is known for its ceramics facilities and workshops; this kiln will strengthen our ability to provide a rich ceramic education."

How is the wood fire process unique?

"The vapor and ash from the wood fly through the kiln and land on the pots. When the ash is hot enough it will flux with the silica and alumina in the clay to form a natural glaze. In this way, the kiln provides opportunities for continued research of natural ash glazes."

Will the kiln offer any other benefits to students?

"Wood firing is a labor-intensive process. Wood needs to be cut and stacked, pots need to be wadded and loaded, cone packs need to be made, the door needs to be bricked up and someone needs to tend the kiln during the entire firing process, which takes at least 24 hours. Students need to work together and depend on each other in order to be successful. This is a great exercise in team work and dependability."

Does the college have other kilns?

"Anoka-Ramsey also has a soda kiln, gas reduction, raku and two electric kilns."

Anoka-Ramsey's Art Department provides an opportunity to explore a variety of arts media by offering introductory studio courses in drawing, ceramics, glass, digital media, painting, photography and sculpture.

Attendance suggests that students are taking advantage of art classes. Art class enrollment has increased by 8.3% in the last 10 years. Enrollment fall 2016:

- 655 students were enrolled in Art courses
- 39 students were enrolled in the Associate in Arts with Arts emphasis degree
- 70 students were enrolled in the Associate in Fine Arts in Art degree
